RATES OF POSTAGE

On First-class Matter.—The rate of postage on first-class is as follows:

1. On letters and other written matter, especially authorized to pass at third-class rates, and on matter otherwise closed against inspection, two cents per ounce or fraction thereof.

2. On newspapers and periodicals, one cent per ounce or fraction thereof at letter-carrier post offices, and one cent for each ounce or fraction thereof at offices where free delivery by carrier is not made.

On Second-class Matter.—The rate of postage on second-class matter when sent by the publisher thereof, and from the office of publication, including sample copies, or when sent from a news-agency to actual subscribers thereto, or to other news-agents, is one cent per pound or fraction thereof.

The rate of postage on newspapers and periodical publications of the second class, when sent by other than the publisher or news-agent, is one cent for each four ounces or fractional part thereof.

The rate of postage on newspapers (excepting weeklies) and on periodicals not exceeding two ounces in weight, when the same are deposited in a letter-carrier office by publishers or news-agents for delivery by its carriers, is uniform at one cent each; on periodicals weighing more than two ounces, two cents each.

Newspapers and periodicals, when deposited by the publisher or news-agent in a letter-carrier office for general or box delivery, are subject to postage at the rate of one cent per pound; when deposited by other than publishers or news-agents for general or box delivery, the rate is one cent for four ounces or fractional part thereof.

Weekly newspapers, when deposited by the publisher or news-agent in a letter-carrier office, for delivery by carriers or otherwise, are subject only to the rate of one cent a pound or fraction thereof.

All second-class publications, when sent by the publisher or a news-agent by mail, to a letter-carrier office located either in the county of publication or elsewhere, are subject to postage at the rate of one cent a pound, which entitles them to delivery by the carriers.

On Third-class Matter.—The rate of postage on third-class matter is one cent for each two ounces or fractional part thereof sent to a single address.

On Fourth-class Matter.—The rate of postage on fourth-class matter is one cent an ounce or fractional part thereof sent to a single address.

PREPAYMENT OF POSTAGE

When and how Postage should be Paid.—The rule of the statutes is prepayment of postage on matter not free in all cases.

On First-class Matter.—The postage is to be prepaid by stamps affixed. But first-class matter will be dispatched if one full rate—two cents—in stamps be affixed, and the residue of the postage will be collected of the addressee before delivery.

On Second-class Matter.—When sent by publishers or news-agents at the pound rate, the postage is prepaid in money, and newspaper and periodical stamps are affixed to the stub of each receipt given; ordinary stamps cannot be used for this purpose.

On second-class matter, sent by other than publishers or news-agents, the postage must be fully prepaid by postage stamps affixed.

On Third-class Matter.—The postage must be fully prepaid by stamps affixed.

On Fourth-class Matter.—The postage must be fully prepaid by stamps affixed.

Foreign Postage Table.

To all countries except Canada and Mexico.

Letters.....	5c per half oz. or fractional
Postal Cards.....	Single 2c.; with paid repl.
Printed Matter of all kinds.....	1c. for each 2 oz. or fraction.
Commercial Papers.....	1c. for each 2 oz. or fraction.
Samples of Merchandise.....	1c. for each 2 oz. or fraction.
Registration Fee.....	8 cents.

A Registered Letter or Package must be fully prepaid.

Domestic Rates.

WHEN PAYABLE IN CANADA, CUBA, NEWFOUNDLAND AND THE PHILIPPINES:

The Domestic form must be used for these Orders.

For Order not exceeding \$2.50,	3 cents	Over \$30 to \$40	15 cents
Over \$2.50 to \$5	5 cents	" \$40 to \$50	18 cents
" \$5 to \$10	8 cents	" \$50 to \$60	20 cents
" \$10 to \$20	10 cents	" \$60 to \$75	25 cents
" \$20 to \$30	12 cents	" \$75 to \$100	30 cents

Intermediary Rates.

Use the International form

International Rates.

WHEN PAYABLE IN ANY OTHER FOREIGN COUNTRY:

Use the International form for these Orders.

For Order not exceeding \$10,	10 cents	Over \$50 to \$60	60 cents
Over \$10 to \$20	20 cents	" \$60 to \$70	70 cents
" \$20 to \$30	30 cents	" \$70 to \$80	80 cents
" \$30 to \$40	40 cents	" \$80 to \$90	90 cents
" \$40 to \$50	50 cents	" \$90 to \$100	1 dollar

Observe that for orders payable in *Canada, Cuba* and the *Philippines* only the Domestic rate is to be charged, and the Domestic forms are to be used.

Take notice that the maximum amount for which a Money Order may be drawn payable in the United Kingdom, Bermuda, Cape Colony, or British Guiana, is \$50.

There is no limitation to the number of International Orders to be issued, in one day, to a Remitter in favor of the same.
